- II. The parable of the ten virgins.
 - A. The movement of desire.
 - 1. Half of life is waiting for something.
 - 2. History will end at the feet of the one that believers wait for--the Bridegroom.
 - B. The movement of division.
 - 1. The people were divided in the way they were waiting for the Bridegroom.
 - 2. Some were wise and some were foolish.
 - C. The movement of delay.
 - 1. The intervening time between the first and second coming would be extended.
 - 2. Watching does not mean unceasing waiting until Jesus returns--watching allows time for normal activities.
 - D. The movement of dismay.
 - 1. Some virgins used up all their oil.
 - 2. The door is shut for those who do not have eternal life, which is knowing God.
 - 3. The danger for the Christian is that he only takes enough of the "oil" of the Spirit to know God doctrinally and not personally.
 - 4. It is only at the cross that one can experience life.
 - 5. Jesus confronts us with the fact that each person must face God individually.
 - 6. One must commit to God whole-heartedly.
