- A. Text: Matthew 25:31-46.
- B. The judgment of the sheep and goats is not a parable, but a fact.
- C. This judgment is not the same as the Great White Throne judgment in Revelation.
- D. This refers to the judgment of the Gentiles.
- E. This judgment is a determination of who will enter into the Millennial Kingdom.
- F. This is a judgment of professing Christians to see who among them is authentic.

## II. Authority of the King.

- A. When Jesus sits on His throne all the nations will bow down before Him.
- B. The Lord's dominion is everlasting.

#### III. The explanation of the King.

- A. The ultimate mark of a member of the kingdom is his practical demonstration of love.
- B. Jesus is forever identifying Himself with those in need.

### IV. The response He receives.

- A. There is genuine surprise on behalf of those who did good and those who neglected to do good.
- B. For the "sheep," there is surprise because their service was joy.
- C. The "goats" are also surprised because they have long lists of all the "good" that they did, but they failed to help the needy in their pride.
- D. The Lord tells these to depart because the "good deeds" were never the unconscious automatic response of the heart indwelt by Jesus Christ.
  - 1. God's judgments take place during the off guard moments that we are unaware.
  - 2. The test is not our actions but our reactions.
- E. What we are must be what He demands.
  - 1. Only the life of Jesus Christ can meet that need within a person through the new birth.

2. One must yield and accept Christ.
