I. Introduction.

- A. Text: II Corinthians 5:5-17.
- B. We take good courage whether at home or away because we aim to please God.

II. The practical implications of the courage we have.

A. We have the Spirit as a guarantee that we will experience the hope of being restored, forgiven, cleansed and empowered in our body.

- B. We are trusting in unseen things.
 - 1. Being out of the body will be strange, but we will be at home.
 - 2. Faith is simply a human response to the divine promise.
 - 3. This is why it is important to learn to walk by faith.
 - 4. Faith pleases God. (Hebrews 11)
- C. We are put here for faithful obedience to the New Covenant.
- III. The great motives of the Christian life.
 - A. The fear of the Lord especially as expressed at the judgment seat of Christ.
 - 1. There is a proper place for fear in the believer's life.
 - 2. God lovingly chastens the disobedient. (Hebrews 12)
 - 3. At the Day of Christ, everyone's works will be tested. (I Corinthians 3)
 - 4. We are usually judged in the moments we least notice.
 - 5. Everyone wants his or her life to matter.
 - B. The love of Christ—the greatest of all motives.
 - 1. The love of Christ controls us.
 - 2. Paul is looking at life from the vantage point of eternity.
 - 3. What Christ has done awakens a tremendous amount of gratitude.
 - 4. Do all things for the Lord's sake.

5. The alternative to the control by Christ's love is control by self-love.

6. Christ died so that people might no longer live for themselves.

7. We regard no one with a human point of view.
