- II. Reasons for persecution.
 - A. For righteousness.
 - 1. Persecution is not suffering for the wrong that we do.
 - 2. When we live the beatitudes we start living against the current.
 - 3. Righteousness means to be different.
 - 4. The presence of righteousness in a godless world makes sin look worse.
 - B. For the sake of Jesus' name. If we are truly living for Christ, they will see Christ whom they are persecuting.
- III. Our response to persecution.
 - A. Our natural response is retaliation.
 - B. We are to have a spiritual attitude toward suffering. (1 Peter 4:1)
 - 1. We should reign. Kings do not act with retaliation.
 - 2. We should rejoice.
 - a. Persecution is a compliment.
 - b. Persecution becomes an opportunity for witness.
 - c. Persecution is an opportunity for growth.
 - C. We should love our enemies. Love them, pray for them and do good to them.

 - A. We keep company with famous people as part of our reward. (Philippians 3:10)
 - B. We reign with Christ in heaven.
 - C. We will have a crown on the other side.
