 - B. I do not have any motivation. The best motivation is from within.
 - C. God made me this way. Jesus emphasized the necessity of producing increase—the one who does not is wicked.

 - E. Some have no ambition.
 - F. Misunderstanding Bible verses about contentment.

 - A. What we think today we will be tomorrow. (Proverbs 4:23)
 - 1. Know Christ lives in you.
 - 2. Know God's power with you will give you the drive and gifts necessary for success regardless of how it looks to you.
 - 3. Know God has your interests in his heart. (Jeremiah 29:11)
 - 4. Know God knows what is best for you. (Ephesians 1:8)
 - B. Motivation: the love of Christ; the necessity of the gospel; the necessity of speaking for God. (1 Corinthians 9:16; Jeremiah 20:9)
 - C. Excitement.
 - 1. The excitement of your purpose on earth.
 - 2. The excitement of being useable. (2 Timothy 2:21; 3:17; Luke 19:10; Romans 1:16)
 - a. The useable man has one great purpose.
 - b. The useable man has removed every hindrance from his life.
 - c. The useable man has placed himself at God's disposal.
 - d. The useable man has learned how to prevail in prayer.

- e. The useable man is a student in the Word of God.
- f. The useable man has a Bible message for the lost world.
- g. The useable man is man of faith who expects results.
- h. The useable man works under the anointing of the Holy Spirit.

- 4. The excitement of the greater than concept. (1 John 4:4; Psalm 27:1; 1 Corinthians 15:57; Romans 8:37; Ephesians 3:20; Psalm 23:1; 2 Corinthians 9:8)
