I. Introduction.

- B. Our words are important to God. (Psalm 101; Proverbs 10:11; 27:9)
- II. Words are like oil and perfume.
 - A. The quality of the oil is determined by the source. The heart is the source of speech. (Psalm 73:8-9; Proverbs 4:23; Matthew 12:34; Psalm 19:14; Philippians 4:8; Proverbs 4:8)
 - B. When oil is too hot it will scorch and when it is too cold it will harden. Our words should be warm. Kind words comfort. (Ephesians 4:31-32; 1 Peter 3:9; Proverbs 18:1-4)
 - C. Oil was used to prepare food. Our words can feed the hungry. One of our highest duties is encouragement. (Proverbs 16:24; 18:20; 31:26; 12:25; 1 Samuel 22:16; 2 Corinthians 16:18; Numbers 13)
 - D. Oil was medicinal. Our words should heal instead of hurt. (Proverbs 12:18; Psalm 64:3; Psalm 140:3; Proverbs 26:28; 26:23)
 - E. Oil was a cosmetic or beautifying agent. Our words should show acceptance and build up. (Proverbs 15:1-4; Ephesians 4:29; Proverbs 12:25)
 - F. Oil was used for light. Our words should bring light. (Psalm 119:105; Proverbs 14:1; 2 Corinthians 2:15)
 - G. Oil was used to consecrate and anoint. Our words are important for our consecrated task of sharing the gospel. (1 Peter 3:15; Colossians 4:6)
